Suggestion was made by Pris Roehm to change the date of "next meeting date to December 19" on the November guild minutes. Motion was then made by Samantha Howell to accept the minutes, and seconded by Jill Kelly. Vote was taken and the minutes were accepted.

Miscellaneous Matters by Pat D'Elia

Theme for today's Christmas party is Winter Wonderland. The January birthday party includes lunch and will be catered by Tidbits. Raney Manning is collecting \$5 for the lunch. The January meeting will also be the installation of new officers to serve 2023. At the January board meeting, local charities will be suggested to receive our proceeds from quilt raffle at QuiltFest. If you have a favorite charity you would like to see chosen, please come to the January 2 board meeting and present your charity.

QuiltFest Board has a new location for meetings at Hospice on Sunbeam Rd. Next meeting is January 17 at 7 p.m.

At the Mandarin Winterfest, Mary Anne Dennis promoted our guild at Walter Jones Park on Mandarin Rd.

Linda Wilson is ill today, so in her stead, Pat needs to know who can bring wagons to the January birthday party to use for distributing the lunches. Sunnie, Pris, Elaine, Sharon, Pat and Laura volunteered.

Pat will be in charge of road trips during 2023 and is planning a road trip to the Daytona Quilt Show on Feb. 24 via bus. The bus costs \$1,700 with 54 seats; plans to charge \$40/person.

The Villages Quilt Show on January 27 does not meet the guild's criteria for a road trip. Due to many logistics too hard to resolve, the guild will not organize such a trip.

QuiltCON is a modern quilt show held in Atlanta on February 23-26. It conflicts with the road trip to the Daytona Quilt Show, but members are encouraged to make their own arrangements to attend QuiltCON if that interests them.

SWEATSHIRT JACKET LECTURE & CLASS INFO

On Monday **Jan. 23, 10:00 to 12 noon**, there will be a **free** lecture with many samples, showing design options you may choose and a demonstration of how to cut the sweatshirt and start sewing, so you can have your own custom jacket, and comfortably work at home. Although this is free, you **MUST** sign up, as there will be a limit to the number of seats available. At the lecture/demo, you will have an opportunity to make a dona-

tion to the Food Bank. No supplies needed for the lecture!

Following a quick lunch break there will be a special hands-on session for those who want to bring all their supplies. Please bring your bag lunch and drink.

The next week, on Monday the 30th, those who are working on a jacket (whether you attended the hands-on or just went home and started on your own) will have a follow-up session at no charge. Bring your jacket for advice, assistance, and encouragement!

FABRICS SUGGESTIONS: you will make a custom shirt so there is no definite amount of fabric! As always, cottons of any kind will be the easiest to sew as you get started. These jackets will be patchwork style, so you don't need to have lots yardage...strips, fat quarters, scraps will be fine. Chose colors & prints that go together. A panel is too big, but you might have some large motifs that would look great as accents! We will be CREATING and having fun!

FEATURED QUILTER

Our Featured Quilter this month is Sharon Tomore. Life began for her in the wee hours of the morning of December 31, 1954, in Jamaica, New York.

Her father supplemented his income by playing piano in area establishments, (rinky dink saloons) which he was doing the night she was born. Her godfather, who had accompanied her mother to the hospital, came to him and said, "Well you are the father of something, but they won't tell me what." Her mother thought to name her after her father, Clifford

John, but the nurse reminded her that she was a girl. They considered naming her after her paternal grandmother, but they didn't think she looked like a Helen. It was finally decided they would name her after her grandmother's favorite flower – the Rose of Sharon which is not a rose at all.

Sharon's father was in the Navy causing them to move every few years, mainly up and down the east coast – Philadelphia, PA, Patuxent River, MD, Key West, FL, Mayport, FL. He retired out of Mayport, and Jacksonville Beach became their permanent home.

She has been here ever since, now living on the westside of Jacksonville.

Sharon met her husband here and they have been married for 49 years. They have two children, a daughter and a son. Each of her children have gifted them with 3 grandchildren giving them a total of 4 boys and 2 girls.

Her mother introduced her to sewing. While in high school, she was required to take a Home Ec. class. During this class they were supposed to construct a dress and a pair of slacks. Did she know anything about "grain" or "ironing her seams" or a hundred other important "need to know facts for a successful garment"? No! Her mother came to her rescue! She doesn't think she ever wore that Home Ec. dress or the slacks.

After having children of her own, Sharon felt the need to sew – simple things like Halloween costumes, and window treatments. She happened on her first sewing machine at a garage sale – a \$35 Kenmore. After becoming somewhat proficient she would sew for her daughter. And then her grandchildren. She has her oldest granddaughter



fooled, she believes Sharon can sew or fix anything.

Sharon has enjoyed many different careers during her life, she bagged groceries, worked as an overseas telephone operator, worked in mortgage banking, was the “girl Friday” for a local boat builder, and retired after 26 years of working in Youth Ministry at a local Catholic church.

Shortly after retirement, she decided to make a quilt. She ordered a couple of charm packs from an on-line pop-up ad and went to town. She assembled the top, pieced the back, and sandwiched it. She tried hand quilting but quickly decided it was too much work. So, Sharon took herself and the quilt to a local shop and threw herself on their mercy. She is happy to say the quilt came out quilt nice and is currently on her bed.

She first attended QuiltFest in 2016 and was blown away by the quality of the craftsmanship and design. A friend invited her to an All Stars Guild meeting. She came, she saw, she joined! It was our welcoming presence, the fellowship and spirit of the members and the willingness to share information and assistance that enticed her to join.

To date she has constructed and finished 9 quilts, two Dresden plate Christmas tree skirts and one Chubby Charmer. Not bad for 5 years’ worth of work! She seriously doubts she will ever enter a quilt in QuiltFest as she doesn’t think she can compete with folks who are professional quilters.

When Sharon is not sewing she enjoys reading, traveling, and camping. Her biggest joy is spending time with her grandchildren.

And what don’t we know about Sharon, she broke her arm while roller skating shortly after her 40th birthday!

I'm Trish and I am happy to once again host Sit 'n Stitch. I love that these Mondays give members a chance to get to know each other and share our quilting on a more personal scale than our big meetings. A lot of learning and helpful ideas happen at Sit 'n Stitch Mondays.

This year at Sit 'n Stitch we will be offering the opportunity for you to assist in ongoing scrap quilt activities for community service. At every Sit 'n Stitch (except special sew-in project days) materials will be provided for you to work on any of a number of tasks aimed at producing community service quilts from the scraps donated to the guild. You can cut squares, sew squares together, make half-square triangles, work on mile-a-minute or crumb quilt squares, etc. Bring your sewing machine and neutral thread or your cutting mat and rotary cutter, and there will be things for you to do. Even if you don't bring your supplies, you can contribute.

Our first scrap quilt, beginning January 9, will be alternate stars and squares blocks. It's a really effective design and very simple. Making the sixteen patch blocks from scrap squares is particularly fun.

And about those special sew-in days. We will be having a community service project every fifth Monday of the month. (There are four this year.) At the one on January 30, we will be making the utility bags that we donate to a number of local service organizations, like Hubbard House and Daniel. Many are needed, so we just can't make too many. Mary Anne Dennis will have fabric and patterns. Just bring your machine and sewing supplies.

As always, you may bring your own project to work on, or to get assistance with, or to get an opinion about, or just to show it off. Come join in. We begin setting up at 9:30 a.m. and work until about noon. Love to have you there.
