Minutes of the Feb. Meeting

February 15, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m.

Thought for the Day is by Albert Einstein: "Imagination is more important than knowledge. Knowledge is limited. Imagination circles the world."

Mary Ann Dennis made a motion to accept the minutes of the January 18, 2021 General Meeting, Ann Carraway seconded the motion. The minutes of the January 18, 2021 guild general meeting were approved as published.

Treasurer Report given by Ellen Ford: There were \$221.95 in expenses during the past month; no intake of any funds, leaving \$10,643.25 as the guild's current balance. Sherry Verrell reported that the audit committee had completed their audit, and found the guild's financial records to be "in perfect order".

Programs: Linda Wilson relayed that the current budget for programs is \$200 and asked

that it be increased to \$1,000. The board had already approved this increase, and the general membership agreed with the increase by a show of hands vote.

President Pat D'Elia: The email hacking using her name continues, and she does not know how to stop it. Pat reported on the Silver Springs retreat held at the Ocala Retreat Center. There were 2 to 3 persons per cabin; demos were split into smaller groups than normal. There will be another Ocala retreat on April 29 to May 2 (Thursday through Sunday) which will include 10 meals.

Vice President Linda Wilson: Nothing new.

Recording Secretary/Quilts of Valor by Linda Marsh: Nothing new.

Guild Challenge/Library by Vicki Zoller: Guild members may still participate in the current challenge; just let Vicki know you'd like to participate. Vicki will accept returned books for the guild library, but is not allowing check outs until further announcement.

Spring Retreat report by Ellen Cannon: For now, the spring retreat is in limbo. Ellen has something she is working on and hopes to provide information next month.

Community Service report by Mindy Ashby: The Mandarin Food Bank collection will be on March 15. Please bring food, hygiene items, paper items, and money donations. The Community Service will participate in the Sewing Room sale by having fabric available for community service projects, and for sale. They are accepting finished quilts.

Education report by Kathi Thompson: Kathi showed a sample of the Attic Windows class coming up, and the class currently has one vacancy. Kathi also showed a sample of the spring placemat to be made at the March 29 class. For the spring placemat class, Kathi will provide a list of supplies when you sign up. It is a flip and sew process; class cost is \$10.

Assistant **Equipment Manager** Delia Bright. Delia has been functioning as lead Equipment Manager and is looking for a back-up person. Delia is usually present at the guild meetings, so the back-up person would not be needed on a routine basis.

June Daniels and Susan Sharpe on **Membership**: 36 members were present at the guild meeting with 10 more members on Zoom. 128 paid members for 2021. The guild directories are ready for pick-up; the members who wanted theirs mailed should receive them shortly. Door prizes were won by Deborah Pearce and Mindy Ashby.

Quilt Mothers Bobbi Redshaw and Raney Manning: They are collecting fat quarters for the 2022 raffle quilt. There will be more information in the guild newsletter. See newsletter for de-

tails. Bobbie mentioned that C.J. Clark is currently out of fabric for making toiletry bags for Hubbard House and asked for fabric donations. Each bag takes 1/2 yard of fabric.

Ways and Means, Ellen Cannon: The quilt on the cover of the guild directory will be raffled in July; tickets will go on sale at the April meeting. Tickets for the Christmas quilt will go on sale in August, and the winner will be drawn at the December meeting. There will be a sewing room sale before and after the April 19 guild meeting. You need to reserve a table in order to bring items to sell.

Website, Pris Roehm: Would like to keep e-blasts to a minimum. Guild newsletter is now being hosted on the guild website.

UFO's by Mary Anne Dennis: She has 7 or 8 members signed up to date for the 2021 UFO challenge. Completed UFOs were shown by Pat D'Elia, Carol Vonderheide, Sharon Buquo and MaryAnne Dennis.

Program: Quilters' Potpourri by Susan Sharpe, Pat D'Elia, Sherry Verrell and Mary Anne Dennis.

Show and Tell: Sharon Buquo, Black and White Cross; Vicki Zoller, Semi Random Quilt; Mary Hoskins, paper piecing; Candy Schladt, One Block Wonder Quilt and an appliqué quilt; Carol Vonderheide, X'Os and pink quilt.

Pat started quilting in 2000 and remembers Sunnie Malesky, also an All Star, as her first teacher! She started taking a variety of classes at Joann's; in addition to teaching herself, when possible. The first quilt she remembers was a "quilt in a day," which was never finished! She says she made poor color choices; it was KING size quilt and nothing came out like it was supposed to. It was definitely NOT done in a "day".

While not sure when she joined the All Star Quilters' Guild, it was probably 2006 or 2007. Sunnie had suggested joining years before, but since she was still working, she could not make it until retirement.

She has served "forever it seems" as Road Trip Coordinator. 
Hand Stitching Group

Our 2020 Raffle Charity: Renewing Dignity

With funding from the Ponte Vedra Women's Civic Alliance and distribution help from Beaches Emergency Assistance Ministry (BEAM), Renewing Dignity provided five pallets (86,400) of sanitary pads for the women and girls at the Jacksonville Beaches who struggle to afford these supplies! Meagan Anderson, BEAM Food Bank Manager, replied, "This will make a big difference in the lives of many women and girls. We have delivered the first pallet to the Mayport USO to help our local military families. Thank you so much!"

Our donation will help continue this organization's fine work in our community.

The All Stars does not support any legislation as a group. But if you personally want to further the aims of this **charity**, you can be an advocate for school girls by letting our state representatives know the importance of all young girls having access to sanitary supplies.

Renewing Dignity asks for your voice to advocate for two bills in the Florida Legislature which will require public school districts to provide free sanitary period supplies to students in need. This is an important education equity issue as one in five girls report missing school because they don't have the basic sanitary supplies they need. Please call your local representatives in the State House and State Senate to support SB242 - "Learning with Dignity" and HB75 - "Feminine Hygiene Products in Public Schools."

MARCH BOM

Improved Four Patch

12" finished


A) Corner Triangles: 2—7" squares cut in half on the diagonal. These are a bit larger so you may trim the block to 12 1/2" raw edges.

B) Big Side Squares: 2—4 3/4" squares

C) Four Patches:

Dark 4 squares 2 5/8"

Light 4 squares 2 5/8"



You can make the 4 Patches with strips:

2 5/8 " wide x 12" long —one light, one dark

Sew them together. The set should be 4 3/4" wide.

Then cut 4 units 3 5/8".

Sew pairs together to make 4 units 4 3/4" at the raw edge.

You might like to make the C squares different colors...in the completed block you can place the lighter squares pointing up...in the final quilt set you could even rotate the whole block and make the B squares point up!

As long as it comes out 12 1/2" on the raw edges, as always, you can do it any way you like!

QUILT INDEX: a treasure trove of all kinds of quilts!

If you want to research quilts, find out what a block looks like, or just look at any sort of quilt, Quilt Index is the place to go. You can search by just about any criteria: block name, place made, color, dates...even what group collected the info! Yes, even all the work we did on Quilt Documentation is in there under Florida Quilt Project (with all the quilts documented by SSQA). Click the SEARCH button at the top to see all the ways you can find things. Feel free to put "Sunnie Malesky" in the Quilt Owner box to find some of my family quilts! Searching QI is a great way to see what other makers have done with blocks or colors you love to use. Have fun!
