SWEATSHIRT JACKET CLASS INFO & SUPPLIES

Because the Food Bank was dear to Sue Abbey's heart, we are also making this a fundraising opportunity. To include as many people as possible, we have a different sort of set up for this!

On Monday **Jan. 23, 10:00 to 12 noon**, there will be a **free** lecture with many samples, showing design options you may choose. This will be followed by a demonstration of how to cut the sweatshirt and start sewing. This will allow everyone to have their own custom jacket, and comfortably work at home. Although this is free, you **MUST** sign up, as there will be a limit to the number of seats available. At the lecture/demo, you will have an opportunity to make a donation to the Food Bank.

Following a lunch break (details on that later!) there will be a special session of hands-on sewing for those who want to bring all their supplies and machines.

This has **10 seats only**, and will require a \$10 donation to the Food Bank to hold your place. (currently filled...get on the wait List, you never know!).

This is the first time she has joined a guild. She finds our guild very welcoming!


Martha has not been very active in our guild yet, visits with her other grandchildren in New Mexico and California conflict with guild activities.

Library News: Books of the Moment

There are two news books in the Guild library. I would like to give credit to the All Stars who donated these books, but I can't remember who gave me the books and there is no name in the front of the books. But I would like to send a big thank you to

everyone who passes their gently used books along the the library for other Guild members to enjoy.

Our first book is Botanical Wreaths: Nature's Glory in Applique by Laura Munson Reinstatler. You might be thinking --oh no, a lot of fussy, difficult hand appliqué. Not for me! For those of you who are experts in appliqué, this book should certainly pique your interest. But you could also fuse and machine appliqué any of the 20 different wreaths in the books. You can also combine many of the wreaths for a stunning, large quilt, or you could do only one wreath for a seasonal wall hanging. My vote is for the latter!

Our second book is Big Stitch Quilting by Carolyn Forster. I know many quilters shy away from hand quilting because they think they could never perfect tiny stitches. But in big stitch quilting, you use perle cotton or shashiko thread and use a longer stitch. You still have that hand quilted look and feel, but the stitching goes much faster and is easier to master. There are 20 projects in the book. Many of them are very simple and use scraps. And who is to say that you have to hand stitch them? They would look fine machine quilted, too.

I hope you will stop by the library at the general meeting. We have books on many aspects of quilting. There just might be something to inspire you for your next project.
