QUILTFEST REPORT

Work is proceeding on this year's QuiltFest, the first since 2019 when Covid disrupted all our lives.

Guild Table

- Sandra Kaye has volunteered to manage this year's Guild table at the show. Guild members who volunteer at the Guild table will answer questions about the guild, sell tickets for the raffle of the Guild's opportunity quilt, and generally represent the guild to the public. Remember, if you volunteer at the Guild table, free admission to the show is not available. Free admission is given to volunteers for QuiltFest jobs, such as white glove, quilters walk, etc.

This year the Guild Outreach display has been consolidated with the Guild table. Guild Outreach provides information about the Guild, such as our charitable activities and other ways we interact with the public. Bobbie Redshaw and her daughter, Raney Manning, made the informational poster for the 2019 show, and they will update it for this year's show. The poster will be on display at the Guild table so that Guild members working at the table can answer questions about All Stars (and maybe recruit some new members).

Silent Auction

- Guild members can donate small quilts for the silent auction. Quilts should be no more than 24" by 24" and no smaller than 8" square (no orphan blocks please). The chair for the silent auction has challenged each guild to provide up to 25 quilts per guild.
- If you have a small quilt that you would like to donate to the silent auction, you can give your quilt to any of the Guild's QuiltFest representatives: June Daniels, Pat D'Elia, Sondie Frus, Veronica Potter, Susan Sharpe and Linda Wilson.
- Proceeds from the auction go to the Shriners transportation fund.

Some reminders about this year's QuiltFest:

- Registration online began on April 1 and will end on July 25.
- The registration form, along with instruc-

tions for entering your quilt, is online at www.quiltfestjax.com

- I have paper forms if you would rather not register on line.
- If you are mailing your quilt, the quilt must be received between August 20 and September 1, 2022.
- Please make sure your quilt is free from offensive odors (cigarette smoke, perfume, pet odors) as these quilts will not be accepted.
- Quilt take-in is Saturday, September 3 (Labor Day weekend) from 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM at the church..

We will be voting for a charity to receive funds from our 2022 Raffle Quilt. Please take some time to learn about them so you can make your best vote. Any charity not selected for this year can be nominated for next year. We like to choose just one so our donation can be a real help for a worthy cause.

- 1) **HerSPACE** : A Transitional Living Facility run by the Northeast Florida Women Veterans .This home-like setting (at Jacksonville Beach) houses up to 6 women (and their children) at a time. Once admitted, the goal is for each vet to learn life skills, find employment and their own housing within 6 months. When leaving the facility, the women are given a mattress (for everyone in her family unit). Everything else needed for a household she has to either buy or have donated. Think of all those items—linens, pillows, dishes, silverware, pots/pan, furniture, to name a few. All-Stars can help get these women who have served our country off to a good start. For more information as well as volunteer opportunities, see Northeast Florida Women Veterans, Inc. www.forwomenvets.org.

- 2) **Volunteers in Medicine**, supports working people who are uninsured. They have a complete range of high quality services that have been unavailable to those who are working but cannot afford health insurance. VIM also acts as a teaching site for physicians, nurses and other health related careers. Learn more at: www.vin.org

- 3) **Lutheran Social Services** – LSS is a local non-profit which helps settle official refugees from around the world, including Afghanistan and Ukraine. Funds shared with LSS will be used to finance the needs of refugees as they settle into life in Jacksonville, supplementing the donations of products and household items from our community. Since October 1, 2021, LSS has

resettled over 250 refugees in Jacksonville.

Vetting refugees takes up to two years each. Current Ukrainian refugees are entering under an established program, the Lautenberg Visa program for religious minorities from former Soviet states. Questions: Jeanne Newton and Sondie Frus can help you.

APRIL MEETING

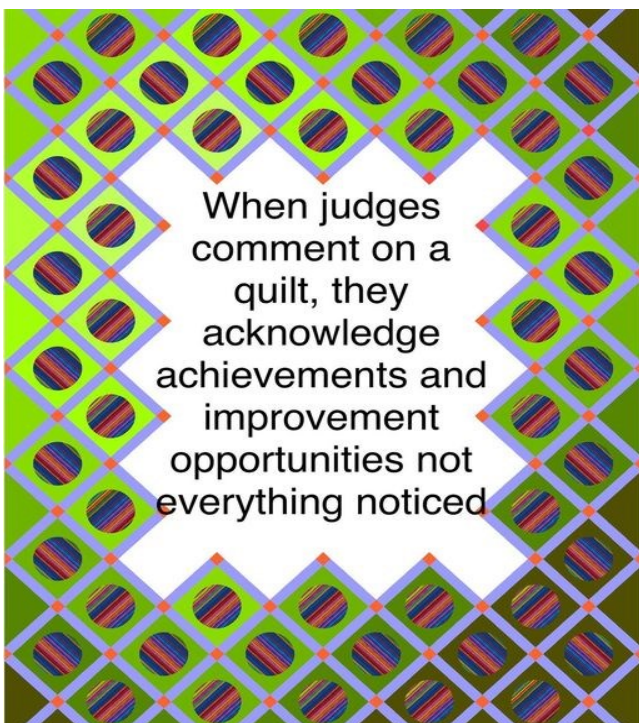

April

APRIL TULIPS

For all BOMs the suggested background will be the **LIGHTEST** value. Please suit yourself by using as many colors as you like, and/ or changing the values. The diagram values shown are to allow you to see the different pieces.

BACKGROUND

4—2" square A

8—2" x 3½" rectangle B

5—3½" square D

DARK

12— 2" square A

MEDIUM

12— 2" square A (8 of these will be used to sew & flip with D)

4— 2" x 3½" rectangle C

Corner sections:

Sew 4—4 patch units each using 2— Dark As, 1—Background A and 1— Medium A

Sew a Medium C rectangle to the D/M side of each 4-patch unit.

Sew 1—2" square Dark A to the end of 4 Background B rectangles

Sew one unit to each of the 4-Patch/ C units.

Side sections:

The 8 remaining medium 2" square As will be used to "Sew & Flip" on 2 corners of 4 D squares.

Draw one diagonal line on the WS of each 2" square.

Place one square in a corner of 4 Ds so the line runs from one side to another (NOT into the corner). Sew on that line.

Press up into the corner to form a triangle (C on the diagram). Trim extra layer out if everything matches up.

After doing 4, go back and do another "SEW & FLIP" square to make the Ds look like the diagram (like a little house).

Sew a B rectangle on the "roof" side of the D/C units.
