Featured Quilter - Cindy Magee

Cindy Magee is our May Featured Quilter. She is originally from Macon, Georgia and lived in Atlanta after getting married. Her husband's job required frequent moves, so she has also lived in 8 other states, ending in Florida in 2021 when her husband retired.



Cindy has been quilting since 1992 — 33 years! A friend in Texas taught Cindy to tie and finish a blue and yellow double knit polyester quilt top Cindy's grandmother had given Cindy decades before. That experience was enough to give her the quilting bug!

Her family then moved to Mississippi where she took a quilting class from a lady in her home. She taught Cindy to trace templates, cut them out with scissors, and trace stitching lines with a pencil. She was then piecing and quilting by hand. The binding was applied by machine on the front and by hand on the back. It was a 20" x 20" star in a star quilt, which she still proudly displays in her home. She has brought the star in a star quilt with her today to show us.

Cindy's next quilt was made for 2-year old son, Jonathan. It was a pinwheel quilt that was machine pieced and hand quilted.

2025 is Cindy's second year in our guild, and she joined because she met a few All Star members through a church contact. The All Star members invited Cindy to sew with them and she heard them talking about guild activities and decided to join. She loves meeting new quilting friends.

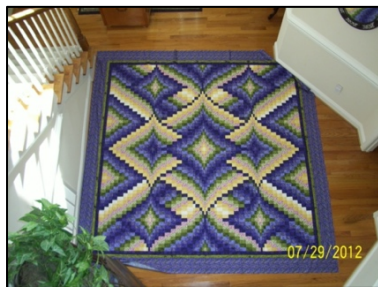
In Cindy's past she has hand-embroidered, crocheted, cross stitched, sewn clothing, scrap-booked, and other miscellaneous crafts. Once she started quilting, she lost interest in everything else. She has incorporated wool embroidery into a few wool quilt pieces in recent years.

Cindy's favorite type of quilting is scrap piecing which includes string piecing and crumb quilting. Each scrap piece of fabric has a memory attached to it because of the first quilt in which the fabric was used.

In North Carolina she had a small long arm business called The Purple Quilter, where she long armed quilts for friends in the guild. She made just enough money to keep buying more fabric!

Cindy discovered Bonnie Hunter in 2009 and Bonnie influenced her quilting and fed her love of scrap quilts by using Bonnie's scrap users' system. Cindy has made a dozen or more of Bonnie Hunter's patterns and follows her blog. She dreams of attending a Quiltville retreat one day. Cindy did meet Bonnie once when she did a talk at her local guild in NC.

Cindy has entered quilts in guild shows in North Carolina and Pennsylvania, and she has won several ribbons!



Cindy made a king-sized bargello that she was very proud of accomplishing and entered it into her Lake Norman Guild Quilt Show in Mooresville, NC. in 2013. Cindy was working as a scribe for the judging of the quilts when the judge graded Cindy's quilt. She watched and listened as the judge critiqued it and found that to be a great learning experience. She listened as the judge pointed to another quilt, also in the Large Bed category and stated how much she liked the other one. She looked back and forth and finally stated that Cindy's quilt deserved the first place ribbon and the other quilt the judge liked in the Large Bed

category would be her Judge's Choice. Cindy says that day she was privileged to see a truly objective judge, which she has learned over the years is sadly not all that common.

For the same quilt show Cindy also entered an original pattern quilt that she had collaborated with an artist friend to make a quilt for the friend's daughter. She again watched as the other judge for the show gave it a First Place ribbon in the Art Quilts category. Needless to say that was a great quilt show for Cindy!



A special quilt memory for Cindy is when she lived in North Carolina and her cousin and cousin's husband came a for a visit. They drove to the mountains for a hike and a picnic off the Blue Ridge Parkway.

Cindy set up the picnic and used one of her scrap quilts as a table cloth. During the meal, Cindy spilled a soda and they all laughed that it was thankfully Cindy who spilled something on the quilt and no one else. The quilt washed up beautifully. A year or so later Cindy packaged the quilt and mailed it to her cousin as a memory of their fun time together. It fits perfectly on the bed in their motorhome where it has been on many adventures.

note: we are **not** allowing crochet or knit items.

Boutique Items to consider:

Kitchen & Household: aprons, placemats, potholders, dish towels, dish cozies, mug rugs, napkins, decorator pillows, pillowcases, rope bowls, fabric bowls, tablet covers.

Bags: purses, change purses, cosmetic bags, jewelry cases, tote bags, travel bags, Dopp kits, backpacks, curling iron bag, shoe bag, grocery bags, treat bag/holders.

For Children: tooth fairy pillow, stuffed animals, dolls & clothes, bibs, hairbows/headbands.

General Meeting Minutes – April 21, 2025 (DRAFT)

President Delia Bright called meeting to order at 10:00 am

President Delia asked for March General Meeting Minutes to be approved. Jill Kelly made a motion to approve the minutes, Randy Powers approved, and Laura Rowe seconded. A vote was taken and the motion passed.

Members were reminded about the Brown Bag Quilt Challenge.

- If you plan to donate the quilt, you can get the batting for free from the Community Service table. But, if you fall in love with the quilt you just made and decide to keep it, you provide your own batting.
- We are trying to encourage making more community service quilts. We provide fabric for the top, backing and batting. If help is needed with binding, ask at the community service table. Someone may volunteer to bind it.
- The big reveal of all the community service quilts that are made will be in October.

Featured Quilter: Linda Marsh is on vacation in Scotland and will return in mid-May. So, there is no Featured Quilter for April, but it will return for May.

President Delia introduced QuiltFest Representative Stacy Shelton.

Stacy is the Volunteer Chairperson for QuiltFest. This is her second year as Chairperson.

Stacy told us that last year we had 615 slots for volunteerism, and we filled 95% of those slots. We will be using SignUpGenius again this year and it goes live on June 1st. All the information and the link to SignUpGenius will be on the QuiltFest website. She will also send this information to each of the Guild Presidents.

If you volunteer for your Guild table, this does not entitle you to free admission to QuiltFest. The purpose of your Guild table is to bring in new members.

There are many Volunteer opportunities with QuiltFest. Display Demos, volunteer check-in, hostess, greeter, viewer's choice, quilters walk, boutique, sale table, selfie booth, silent auction and quilt take-in. One QuiltFest volunteer slot entitles you to one non-transferable ticket.

Sign up begins on June 1st and we have until September.

Stacy can be contacted by calling or texting her if there are any questions. There are both sitting and standing/walking positions. Most volunteer slots are 2 hours; Judging is in 4 hours slots. Help is needed with set up and take down.

She has asked that if you are entering a quilt, please volunteer to help take down quilts.

QuiltFest has been shortened this year, and the doors will be closed at 4:00 pm on Saturday.

PRI Production will be setting up all the frames. We handle only the quilt part.

Pat D'Elia told us that today we have Mary Janine Ibarguen from Maitland, and she is going to show us her Stash Buster Program. She will show examples of several projects and then we will vote for which project we want her to teach on June 9th. Sign up for this class will be taken after this meeting.

Membership

Susan Sharpe - 10 directories were handed out. There were 2 winners in the membership drawing.

We are up to 153 guild members. 93 people are present today. We had one guest, Nancy Pickering. She saw our advertisement in the Mandarin News.

We had two renewals, Andrew Pellegrino and Susan Kingston.

Susan would like for volunteers to greet people at the Sew-Cial at Calico Station on April 26 at 11am – 3 pm. Gloria Hart, Donna Caldarise, and Laura Rowe volunteered. Time slots are 1-2 hours.

The first Sew-Cial was at Cinnamons, and we got about 10 new members. The Sew-Cial is not about recruiting members for the guild. It is about providing information about QuiltFest. Calico Station on Wells Road asked that anyone who has a tent to bring it. Also, they ask that each guild bring a game. Ex: how many yards are on a bolt or buttons in a jar. A question was raised, are there going to be T-Shirts ordered again. Susan said we might think about it.

Vice President

Pat D'Elia has flyers referencing the Sew-Cial. This is the third Annual Sew-Cial. We try to help a different Quilt shop each time. 1st was at Cinnamons; 2nd was at Bee's in St Augustine and this, the 3rd is at Calico Station. They are vendors at our show & they are sponsoring this Sew-Cial. They will be providing some food and water. They are also giving discounts on fabric.

QuiltFest is coming in September, so get your quilts ready to be registered. You can be involved with QuiltFest. Know where we stand, how we're doing, how many vendors. Quilt registration started on April 1st and there are 4 quilts registered so far.

Entering more than one quilt? You can write one check for the total amount. But for most people, when registering you will get a prompt for PayPal. Then the payment will be immediate.

QuiltFest is a 100% volunteer show. We're up to 42 vendors as of last week. We get vendors into June and July. Parking will still be free for us. Funds from Friends of QuiltFest are utilized to pay the Prime Osborn's fee for parking. Friends of QuiltFest is \$5.00 per line and this helps to defray the cost of parking.

The prices of tickets, and quilt registration and vendor booths are not going up this year. If there are any questions, the website has information and there are 6 representatives in this guild who can help you.

Deb Frain and Ellen Cannon talked about the Boutique and Friends of QuiltFest. One line is \$5.00, two lines will be \$10, etc. There are forms that explain how many characters you can put per line. Make checks out to QuiltFest of Jacksonville or pay cash. Forms can be taken home to complete. Bring the form back next month with your fee. Deb will be collecting entries for the program through July.

Boutique- last year was the first year for the Boutique at QuiltFest and it was a success. Thanks to Ellen Cannon for coming up with the idea.

We're asking for members to make items to sell. 15% goes to the guild and 85% goes to you.

There will be more information next month to explain how to complete the forms. Deb will be here with the forms starting in May through August. If you have a display for your items, you can drop it off with the items you're selling. Make sure to label the display with your name and phone number.

Drop off will be Tues 9th and Wed 10th of September. If you're coming to the Judging, you can bring your items and display and drop them off as well. Boutique items as well as the entered Quilts will be stored securely in a locked room.

Consider putting some of your items in the Silent Auction. Identify these items when dropping off your Boutique items.

Hand sewn items and wool items as well can be put in the Boutique as well this year.

The password was not published in the Newsletter because of the sensitive nature of the information. The Newsletter for May might be a few days late. The QuiltFest icon is back on the front page. When we get the button for volunteer sign-ups it will be added.

We currently have 75 people on the Facebook page. Jenny sent out an email that says "your newsletter is attached. The membership phone/email list is current and here is the password".

The password is for the "Members Only" phone/email list at the top of the website page. Click on the button and a prompt for "Members Only" will appear, enter the password and download the list. You can call or email from the list. There are no birthdates / years listed.

There is an article on the Facebook page that is a YouTube video that is about Free Trade and Tariffs and how they are going to affect quilters and the cost of things.

President: Delia introduced our guest speaker, **Mary Janine Ibarguen** who presented a Trunk Show with samples from her classes. The guild members will vote on one project to be the subject for her June 9th class. She also spoke about her newsletter and website, Florida Quilt Network which was begun in 1999 and lists every quilting event in Florida.

Mary will share tips and techniques in her Stash Buster class. She showed and explained several patterns and their versatility in design. The three that she showed us were Wonky Stars, Twisty Treat and 16 Patch Choice. We voted for one of these to be the subject of her June 9 class.

16 Patch Choice won by a landslide. The members will pay \$10.00 for the class and the balance of Mary's fee will be funded from the AllStar education money. There is a class size limit of 20 unless someone can help with machine issues. If there is someone to help with the machines, the class size would be raised to 30. We bring our own fabrics.

Vice President Pat D'Elia suggested that maybe we could have Mary back on a separate day from our meeting.
